Creating big smiles across Oregon

The Tooth Taxi delivers more than \$500,000 in free dental care in first six months

Launched only a few months ago in September 2008, the Tooth Taxi is already making a tremendous difference in the lives of children throughout Oregon. As of March 31, the Tooth Taxi had delivered \$514,845 in free dental care to 1,853 children in 29 communities.

The Tooth Taxi is the result of a unique partnership among the Dental Foundation of Oregon (DFO), OEA Choice Trust and The ODS Companies. For up to one week at a time, the mobile dental clinic visits schools and community centers,

delivering comprehensive dental care and oral health education to low-income children — and touching the hearts of everyone involved.

“The response to the Tooth Taxi has been outstanding,” said Patrick Nearing, D.M.D. and chair of the DFO board of directors. “Schools have been wonderful partners, connecting us with the children who need the most help, and many dentists and staff members are finding it a great way to support their communities. It’s great for the kids and for dentistry.”

Oregon's children need you

- Oregon children’s oral health is among the worst in the nation.
- The number of Oregon children with untreated tooth decay jumped 12 percent in the past five years.
- Nearly 56 percent of children 6 to 8 years old have dental decay. The numbers are even higher for low-income families.

rise during difficult times. We are very pleased to recognize some outstanding volunteers and programs on pages 4 and 6.

Recently, a young mother whose child had been treated on the Tooth Taxi dug into her purse to give us \$2 in change because she wanted to thank us and help other children get the care they need. Her gift was exceptional, not for its size, but because it came with priceless wisdom. She understands, like many of you, that we can accomplish more by pulling together than we can as individuals.



Foundation grants approach \$1 million mark



Using donations from individual dentists, companies and foundations, the DFO has distributed more than \$966,000 in grants to community dental programs throughout Oregon since 1982. To date, DFO grants have helped provide clinical care and oral health education to well over 200,000 Oregonians.

In 2008 alone, the DFO provided grants to 18 community organizations that delivered treatment and education to more than 20,000 people throughout the state.





- Only 20 percent of Oregon communities have fluoridated water, ranking us No. 48 among the 50 states.
- Oregon educators estimate that nearly 5,000 school children experience dental pain and tooth decay every day in our schools.
- Dental disease is more pervasive than asthma in children, and if left untreated, it can lead to serious health issues and even death.
- Dental disease is not just a cosmetic issue — two years ago, a 12-year-old child died when an untreated infected tooth led to a brain infection.



As of the end of March, 89 volunteers including dentists, hygienists, dental assistants and community coordinators had served on the van, providing well over 580 hours of community service. In fact, some dentists have taken their entire staff to serve for a day.

“Volunteering on the Tooth Taxi was a great experience for me and my staff,” said Dr. Rick Asai, D.M.D. “It was difficult to see so many children with poor oral health, but it felt good to be helping, and I know we made a real difference. My staff had a wonderful time.”

In addition to professional dental volunteers, many school employees and nurses have worked tirelessly to identify children in need of dental care, get parental permission forms signed and coordinate student visits to the Tooth Taxi.



Karen Bateman, secretary to the principal at Jefferson Elementary and Dan Easdale, Kidco Headstart family advocate helped coordinate the Tooth Taxi visit.

“Many of the school district employees have been instrumental in helping make this program successful,” said Holly Spruance, OEA Choice Trust Marketing Representative and school liaison for the Tooth Taxi program. “Schools have been supportive in helping ensure that the students most in need have an opportunity to receive care from the dental team on the Tooth Taxi.”

Shannon Richards, whose daughter was treated on the Tooth Taxi, asked Dr. Weston W. Heringer if she could give him a hug. She got up, gave him a hug and started crying. The next day when she brought her son to the van to get care, she brought the staff home-baked muffins and a heartfelt thank you note.

Awards of excellence ●●●●●●●●

The George A. Ronning Humanitarian Award: Beaverton Rotary

This award is a tribute to the late Dr. George A. Ronning, a leader in the dental community, a caring dentist and a model statesman. The foundation board selects the winner for the Ronning Award from previous grant recipients who exemplify the highest standards and ethical principles in dentistry. This year, the award was given to the Beaverton Rotary Foundation for its annual Dental Check/Dental Aid Day that has provided free dental care to thousands of underserved children for the past 12 years.

Dentist of the Year Award: Dr. Kent Zerr

DFO recognizes one doctor for his or her long-term service and commitment to volunteerism.

An active member of the community, Dr. Zerr has served as an on-board dentist for 52 mobile dental clinics and donated more than \$175,000 in dentistry services to children and adults in the Salem area. He is also the founder of the school safety net program Dental Health Solutions, which provides urgent care for school children.

Healing Hands Award: Robert Cochrane

The foundation recognizes a dental assistant who has made a significant contribution to the community in service of dental care. Cochrane has volunteered as a dental assistant with MTI since 2001, served with more than 390 dental clinics and logged nearly 2,000 volunteer hours assisting dentists and helping thousands of patients get the oral health care they need.

Give a Grin 2008

The foundation's Give a Grin campaign raised \$15,487 with the help of three dental practices and seven individuals. Participating dental offices contributed the proceeds from one day's work to the foundation, and individuals contributed one day's salary.

Give a Grin provides a unique fundraising opportunity for members of the Oregon community who care about improving dental health for less fortunate children. Participants work one day, in their own offices and with their own staff, patients and equipment. It is an opportunity to make a difference without leaving the work place.




